

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Replacement of Nobleton Groundwater Production Well #3

In the Township of King



Construction continues on the new groundwater production well at 14 Royal Avenue in the community of Nobleton. The new groundwater production well #7 will replace existing production well #3 and provide system redundancy.

Construction of the new groundwater production well #7 is expected to be completed by fall 2022.

There is a short-term lane restriction on Royal Avenue during construction. Traffic flag persons are on-site, as needed, to help with the movement of traffic.

Access to all homes will be maintained and there are no planned impacts to your water or wastewater services.

Temporary bypass piping has also been installed on the roadside and ditch to help with draining water from the production well.

Water is part of everything we do; showering, staying hydrated while exercising, washing our hands, watering our gardens and so much more! Every day, York Region collects, treats and stores more than 325 million litres of drinking water. Generally, York Region's water is supplied by groundwater production wells and Lake Ontario water, which is blended in reservoirs, water towers and distribution pipes.

The community of Nobleton's water comes primarily from groundwater, which is an underground water supply found in soil and rock crevices—and it recharges indefinitely, if the water usage does not exceed the natural recharge rate. By using less water, it saves you money, protects our environment and ensures the community of Nobleton has enough water for daily use and emergencies.
