



Animal bedding, pet waste, kitty litter, bird seed, pet food, pet fur, feathers and sawdust (wood sources only).



Houseplants and flowers

No yard waste.

Yard waste

Yard waste is collected with recycling every second week from April to November.



*there are some exceptions due to holidays

There is <u>no limit</u> on the amount of yard waste that can be put out for collection, as long as acceptable containers are used.

Place weeds, plant trimmings and leaves in paper yard bags or any rigid open top container that has handles. Bundle branches with twine only, no rope.

Please note: No grass clippings!

These items should not be placed with yard waste: kitchen scraps, rocks, dirt, sod, tree stumps, branches larger than 10cm in diameter, flower pots/trays, painted or treated wood and animal droppings.



3 REASONS TO RECYCLE GRASS CLIPPINGS



Leave grass clippings on the lawn and reap the benefits of a healthier landscape: no chemicals required

- Grass clippings are rich in nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium, the three major ingredients in commerical fertilizers.
- 2 Grass clippings contain up to 85% water, helping the lawn retain moisture.
- In the landfill, grass clippings account for 75% of yard waste; leaving them on the lawn reduces waste.



FIGHT THE BITE! AGAINST BLACKLEGGED TICKS AND LYME DISEASE

What is Lyme disease?



Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria called Borrelia burgdorferi which is spread through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.

Symptoms of Lyme disease may include:

- · A skin rash · Fever or chills
- Fatigue or weakness
- Dizziness or confusion
- Muscle and joint pain
- Headache
- Swollen lymph nodes

See your health care provider if you develop symptoms of Lyme disease after a tick bite or after visiting a wooded or brushy area.

Protect yourself in wooded or brushy areas

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved clothing and closed footwear
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- · Walk in the middle of trails
- · Shower when you get home
- Check yourself, your family and your pets for ticks
- Remove attached ticks as soon as possible



What are blacklegged ticks?



- Ticks are small bugs that feed off the blood of animals and humans
- Adult ticks are the size of a sesame seed and nymphs are the size of a poppy seed
- Ticks are found on tall grasses and bushes in wooded areas
- They can attach and feed up to five days

If you find a tick on you or or a family member remove it quickly



- Grasp the tick with tweezers as close as possible to your skin and pull it straight out
- Do not put anything on the tick or try to burn it off
- Disinfect the area with rubbing alcohol

Recap needle and place into approved sharp container offered free of charge at any participating pharmacy.





Once the sharp waste has reached the designated fill line, snap lid closed by securing the strip.





To permanently close the sharps container, insert the tab into the opening to secure the lid down.



Always use an approved sharps container when disposing of used sharps to help reduce the risk of needlestick injuries.

How to protect yourself when outdoors

- Wear light-coloured, long-sleeved shirts and pants
- Use insect repellents containing DEET or icaridin
- Cover up at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active



How York Region protects you

York Region's West Nile Virus Program includes larviciding over 100,000 catch basins during the summer and using mosquito traps to capture and test for West Nile virus infected mosquitoes.



Mosquito-proof your home

- Clean up areas of standing water around your home
- Ensure door and window screens are tight-fitting and in good repair
- Clean up pools / pool covers
- Turn over wading pools
- Empty out flower pots
- Clear eavestroughs, storm and roof gutters
- · Clean bird baths weekly
- Empty water in old tires

What is Household Hazardous Waste?



Household hazardous waste (HHW) is anything in your home that is corrosive, explosive, flammable or poisonous and is no longer needed. It should be brought to a HHW depot where it will be disposed of safely.

Examples of HHW:

- Aerosol cans (full or partially full)
- Batteries
- Cleaning products
- Cosmetics
- Fertilizers
- Fluorescent light bulbs and tubes
- Gasoline (containers may not be returned)
- Glues and adhesives
- Nail polish and polish remover
- Paints (liquid and solid)

· Paint thinner and varnish remover

- · Perfume and cologne
- · Pesticides, insecticides and herbicides
- Pharmaceuticals
- Propane cylinders/tanks
- Pool chemicals
- Sharps (needles/syringes) must be in puncture proof container
- Used motor oil and filters

Residents can drop off 60L of household hazardous waste and 20 compact fluorescent tubes per household per day.

What is Electronic Waste?



Electronic waste (e-waste) is any electronic equipment in your home that no longer works and cannot be repaired. E-waste should not be thrown in the garbage as these items contain materials considered to be hazardous.

Examples of e-waste:

- Cables
- · Cameras and camcorders
- Cell phones, telephones, pagers and fax machines
- Computer towers, laptops, tablets, modems, keyboards and mice

- Game systems
- Monitors, printers, scanners and typewriters
- Televisions
- VCRs, DVD players, radios, stereos, speakers

Maximum 50 kg per household per day. Remove all packaging and batteries. Disassembled electronics will not be accepted.

FATS, OILS and GREASE

Cool it, Scrape it, Green Bin it



Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) can clog your pipes and our sewers when poured down the sink, drain or toilet.

Fats, oils and grease include:

butter and margarine, meat fats, salad dressings, cooking oils (including deep frying oils), sauces, gravies, shortening and lard.

Proper Disposal

- · Fats, oils and grease should be allowed to cool and harden, then scraped into the green bin
- . Use a small amount of paper towel to help wipe and absorb the liquid before placing it in your green bin
- Liquid cooking oil can also be dropped off at a York Region waste depot to be recycled

Furniture, mattresses and box springs, plastic lawn furniture, toilets (2 piece toilet must be separated), carpets cut in 5' lengths and tied, not weighing more than 50 lbs. can be placed at the curb on your regular garbage week. Purchase a \$12.00 bulk item tag at one of the locations listed on page 4. Price subject to change.

- · Personal hygiene products
- Pet/animal waste

- Baby/cleaning wipes Plastic bags/film
- Clothing Cutlery
