King making changes to non-essential services due to new Provincial directives

Township continues to provide services online, by phone and through email

In order to comply with the new Provincial health directives aimed at combatting the soaring COVID-19 case numbers, the Township is making changes to its non-essential services. Starting Wednesday, January 5, 2022, all non-essential in-person services will be temporarily unavailable until at least January 26, 2022, the earliest approximate date set by the Province.

This will result in the temporary closure of King's

- arenas and community centres
- fitness programs and indoor activities
- the King Township Municipal Centre
- the King Heritage and Cultural Centre

The King Township Public Library will operate at a reduced capacity. For more information, visit www.kinglibrary.ca.

All essential services will continue, including Fire and Emergency Services, water, wastewater, waste collection, by-law enforcement and road and sidewalk maintenance.

Provincial COVID-19 Measures

The newly announced measures include:

- Reducing social gathering limits to five people indoors and 10 people outdoors
- · Limiting capacity at organized public events to five people indoors
- Requiring businesses and organizations to ensure employees work remotely unless the nature of their work requires them to be on-site

- Limiting capacity at indoor weddings, funerals, and religious services, rites and ceremonies to 50-per-cent capacity of the particular room.
- Retail settings, including shopping malls, permitted at 50-per-cent capacity. For shopping malls physical distancing will be required in lineups, loitering will not be permitted and food courts will be required to close
- Closing indoor meeting and event spaces with limited exceptions but permitting outdoor spaces to remain open with restrictions
- Public libraries limited to 50-per-cent capacity
- Closing indoor dining at restaurants, bars and other food or drink establishments. Outdoor dining with restrictions, takeout, drive through and delivery is permitted
- Closing museums, galleries, zoos, science centres, landmarks, historic sites, botanical gardens and similar attractions, amusement parks and waterparks, tour and guide services and fairs, rural exhibitions, and festivals. Outdoor establishments permitted to open with restrictions and with spectator occupancy, where applicable, limited to 50-per-cent capacity
- Closing indoor sport and recreational fitness facilities including gyms. Outdoor facilities are permitted to operate but with the number of spectators not to exceed 50-per-cent occupancy.
